
What should I do if I suspect bone sarcoma?



Conventional **osteosarcoma** and **Ewing sarcoma** are rare malignant mesenchymal tumours. They can arise at any site and are characterised by unique biological characteristics.

Localisation



Typical signs and symptoms



Non-mechanical bone pain



Progressive pain



Swelling at the site of the tumour



Pain predominant at night



Persistent pain

The variety and rarity of bone sarcoma may lead to difficulties in appropriate diagnosis.

If you suspect bone sarcoma

Refer patients to a **sarcoma reference centre** for diagnosis and treatment. **DO NOT** perform a biopsy or initiate intervention/treatments as supervision by a multidisciplinary tumour board is critical.
